Missouri Voters' Opinions on Open Enrollment in Public Schools

The following document summarizes the opinions of likely voters in Missouri on issues related to open enrollment in schools (i.e., allowing students who live in one school district to attend public schools in a different school district). Subjects include voters' support of allowing open enrollment, allowing schools to restrict who they accept, transportation for students, and funding for schools. These results are from SLU/YouGov Polls conducted from June 2020 to February 2025.

Key Missouri Findings from the February 2024 Poll

- 59% of Missouri voters support allowing students to enroll in public schools outside of the district where they live.
- 83% of Missouri voters believe transferring students or their guardians should be responsible for transportation to and from nonresident districts.
- 39% of Missouri voters support allowing school districts to opt out of having students transfer into their districts. 43% oppose.
- 30% of Missouri voters support transferring more than half or all local tax revenue designated for a student's education to the nonresident school district, where the student now attends school.
